




Equitable Access Waitlist Movement

Coming Soon: Student Assignment & Boundary Study

This project will launch in January 2023 and run through December 2023

Background: CM Henderson recently passed a bill that DME conduct the study in 2023 and every 10 years thereafter. Note, **boundaries were last studied in 2013.**

Goals of the Study:

1. Students have clear assignments to schools by right based on DCPS attendance zones and feeder pathways.
2. There is adequate capacity in the geographically zoned DCPS facilities at each grade level (PK, ES, MS, HS), including feeder pathways,
3. There is equitable access among District students to high-quality public schools through assignment and enrollment policies.

Elements of the study: (examples of the types of elements that will be included in the study)

- Boundaries for new the upcoming new Foxhall ES and Euclid Street MS.
- Potentially identify and recommend adjustments to boundaries and feeder patterns for other projected overcrowded and underutilized schools;
- Consider how DC is ensuring equitable access to high-demand schools

Community engagement:

1. **Advisory committee** of District agency (including DCPS reps), school community, and education stakeholders who reviews information to vet potential recommended options.
2. **Townhall meetings** starting soon after the start of process to provide feedback on guiding principles, analysis, and potential recommendations.
3. Meetings with **individual school communities** to discuss potential boundary revisions.
4. Online opportunities to provide feedback throughout the duration of the project.

We look forward to sharing more during the January CLB Meeting.


EdFEST 2022

Future of EdFEST Working Group

The Future of EdFEST Working Group will determine how EdFEST can best achieve its goal of providing students and families with direct access to the District's public school options (PK3 – Grade 12) in advance of the My School DC lottery application cycle.

- Members of the working group include parents, school staff, and partner organizations.
- Updates shared out to this group during CLB meetings.
- Final recommendation will be shared with board members ahead final approval decision in June.



Data Sharing

Background

At the last CLB meeting board members did *not* approve the Urban Institute data request because parents had not given permission (at the time they applied) to be contacted by researchers.


Urban Institute Data Request

- Guardian Telephone #1 & #2



Such standards shall be uniformly applied to all students." and "My School DC does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion, marital status, personal appearance, sexual orientation, family responsibilities, physical handicap, matriculation, or political affiliation in its programs and activities. Discrimination will not be tolerated and persons engaging in such will be subject to disciplinary action."
- Final disclaimer: "The information submitted on this application may be shared with third parties such as researchers for evaluation and planning purposes in order to improve the common lottery. Student and guardian information will not be made public."

Today we will discuss whether to add a permission question to the upcoming lottery application so that *future* PK3 families can be contacted.

PAC Recommendation

The possibility of adding a question to the application was presented to the Parent Advisory Council (PAC) during their meeting on 10/3. The members present at meeting were in **unanimous opposition** to asking for permission to be contacted on the application. Chief concerns voiced included:

- Jeopardizes trust in the system.
- May disincentivize applicants from submitting their applications.
- Regarding the Urban analysis, PAC members raised concerns that trends amongst those choosing to opt in would skew survey results.

Generally speaking – PAC members are supportive of research being done to learn more about DC, school choice, and enrollment in general, but think researchers need to find other ways to get families' contact information.

Boston Public Schools

We additionally spoke with the Boston Public School (BPS) lottery to discuss their approach to data sharing. They do not share parent contact information to researchers and therefore do not have any permissions built into their application process.

They advised us to not add a data sharing consent question to our application. Their reasoning:

They do not want to create any hesitation for a parent to complete and submit their application.
