





Entry Grades Trends



Most grades saw an increase in applications vs. last year. PK4 and K did not.

Fewer New PK4 Applicants in 2022

Pre-Kindergarten 3 to Pre-Kindergarten 4



Last year, ~1200 fewer students entered the PK3 lottery compared with pre-pandemic average.

Typically, 1 in 4 PK3 applicants re-enter the lottery for PK4.

Fewer New & Returning K Applicants in 2022

Pre-Kindergarten 4 to Kindergarten



Last year, ~500 fewer students entered the PK4 lottery compared with pre-pandemic average.



Typically, 1 in 4 PK4 applicants re-enter the lottery for K. This year it decreased further to almost 1 in 5.





Most Grades Offered More Seats than Applicants




For the first time, more seats than applicants were offered in every Elementary grade.

Additionally, DC schools offered the largest number of 9th grade seats in MSDC history.

Seats Filled by School


270 school options* offered 27,630 seats in the lottery. 59% of those seats were matched with a student.





Since 2018, Fewer Schools Matched 100% of Seats

In 2018, 48% of school programs matched 100% of seats offered in the lottery.




During the pandemic, only roughly 1 in 3 school programs matched 100% of their seats offered.



As the number of seats offered into the lottery increased, fewer school programs matched all offered seats.

Median Number of Seats Matched

As additional school choices and seats have been added, the median number of seats matched has continued to drop.



Equitable Access: Results by LEA

Every participating LEA matched at least one student.

As the starting year, analysis is ongoing to understand how the adoption of this policy improved student's & family's chances to match.



Planned Next Steps

Analysis: comparison of student outcomes to what would have happened if Equitable Access preference/designated seats had not been implemented (i.e., how many students have been matched anyway?)

Meet: Debrief with schools who opted in, gather lessons learned, get feedback on My School DC's part of the process, etc.,

Support: Office hours for other charters considering opting in. Share lessons learned.

Policy Guide Updates

School Relocations

Current Policy Guide Language

“A school with an uncertain facility remains invited to participate and to collect applications through MSDC, but a waitlist will be created for the school rather than a match list if the facility remains unsecured by February 9, 2022.”

Challenge: The language is not clear enough on schools that currently have a secure location but are pursuing a relocation.

Goal: Ensure that applicants are not matched to a school without:

1. Knowing about the location change, and
2. Being given an opportunity to update their school choices if the new location is not amenable to them prior to the deadline.

Proposed addition: Families who may apply or have already applied to a school must be made aware of a relocation, or potential relocation if the decision has not been finalized, prior to January 9th (high schools) or February 9th (PK3-8). If the decision to relocate is made after that point, a waitlist will be created for the school rather than a match list.



Remaining loophole: School's decision to relocate is made after lottery results are released.

Remaining question: Should exceptions be made for relocations within .25 miles?

Discuss now. Vote to finalize 2023-24 policy guide in July.

Late Changes in the Last Few Cycles



*Schools are prevented from being matched with students if they do not have a secure location by February 9th.

**LAMB applicants were notified at the time of application that a campus consolidation was likely to happen

Late Change Requests: Who Decides?

Current Policy Guide Language

“If MSDC receives a change request to any published data which has the likelihood of impacting an applicant’s school selections and rankings on their application, such as changes to the **school’s existence, school name, operator, location or grades served**, then those change requests will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.”

Goal: Clarify when late change requests can be approved or denied by the MSDC staff and when a CLB meeting and vote to approve is necessary.

Recommend removing “school name” and “location” from this list. (Assuming location changes fully covered under proposed additional language on previous slide.)





Equitable Access : Participating Schools

27 schools from 12 LEAs participated for SY22-23 by either applying a preference or designating seats.

Preference – applicants with a preference are offered a space before other applicants.

Designated Seats - a number of seats are set aside specifically for these students.
